REFLECTION Fifth Sunday of Lent (C)

The story of the woman caught in adultery reminds us that God is full of mercy and compassion. But he is also God of justice, so that his mercy is without prejudice to his justice. The demands of mercy and justice allow us to understand the attitude of Jesus to the woman. Jesus will not condemn the woman. Yet he will also say to her to go and not sin again. Thus, while he does not approve of her sin, he nonetheless sets her free and gives her a fresh opportunity to make up for her lack.

The point is that the demand of law is not opposed to the demand of mercy provided we understand that the demand of law finds its fulfilment in the demand of love. Without love, law becomes oppressive. Indeed, throughout his teaching ministry, Jesus was always at pain to preserve the continuity between law and love. Thus, it would be wrong to accuse Jesus of desecrating the law or encouraging people to disregard it. For at a deeper level the concern of Jesus is to point out that the ultimate law is the law of love, so that the integrity of every law must be judged ultimately in terms of whether or not it fulfilled the law of love.

The contrast between the Scribes and the Pharisees and Jesus' respective reception of the situation is remarkable. Both are faced with the same situation. But they react differently. The scribes and the Pharisees were convinced that the woman had violated the law, so that in keeping with the provisions of the law, she must be punished accordingly. She must be condemned to death by stoning.

Yet despite what the law said on this seemingly unequivocal matter, the Scribes and Pharisees were prepared to approach Jesus to ask his opinion. However, as scripture makes clear they had a hidden agenda for it was not merely to get his sincere opinion as their intent was to trap him, convinced he would take a different position, so that they could find something to use against him.

However, they were disappointed as Jesus did not offer a direct answer to the question "what have you to say?" On the contrary he responded indirectly, bending down and then writing on the ground with his finger. After a while he looked up and said, "If there is one of you who have not sinned, let him be the first to throw a stone at her". "When they heard what he said, they went away one by one, beginning with the eldest, until Jesus was left alone with the woman, who remained standing there." He looked up and said, "Woman where are they? Has no one condemned you? No, one sir, she replied. Neither do I condemn you, said Jesus go away and do not sin anymore."

We are all beneficiaries of God's mercy as revealed by Jesus in his attitude to the woman. While his initiative speaks to the heart of our experience and thus brings us consolation, it also challenges us at another level, not to assume an overly self-righteous attitude towards others but to allow the mercy of God to inform our dealings with them, even when they are seemingly unworthy of mercy.

The claim of mercy upon us is overwhelming. If we are a beneficiary of God's mercy, we too must become apostles of his divine mercy. What we receive from God, we must extend to others.

The discipline of Lent should awaken in us the reality of our sinfulness and God's mercy and as such motivate us to return to the Father's house. May we never despair of his mercy nor delay in returning to his love when we fail him. Above all as we experience God's mercy and love amidst our spiritual brokenness may we also become merciful in our dealing with others, leading them to experience precisely what we have received, namely, God's mercy and forgiveness.
